## **Boy Saved by Fire** Copter Enjoys Yule

Santa Claus came early this year for a Kankakee county family—and he rode in a Chi-cago fire department. hellcopter.

A mission of mercy by a fire department helicopter crew saved the life of 2-year-old Michael Zurek of Grant Park.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Zurek, were so grateful to the firemen, as well as to the police who assisted in the emergency, that they wrote to The Tribune praising the men.

## Corn Stuck in Throat

Michael was playing in the living room of his farm home near the Indiana state line, east of Grant Park, on Dec. 6 when he put a kernel of Indian corn from a hard, dry ear into his mouth.

seconds, the Zureks Within found their son gasping for air. Mouth to mouth resuscitation and shaking him upside down failed to dislodge the corn from

his windpipe. They left their five older children with a neighbor and drove 30 miles to St. James hospital in Chicago Heights as a snow-

## Firemen Answer Plea

An appeal for help was issued, and a helicopter piloted by Edward McCarthy, a fireman, was ordered into the air from Meigs field by Robert Quinn, Chicago Fire commis-sioner. "It is unusual for us to go that far away, but this was a serious emergency," Quinn said. "We are ready to go anywhere to save a life."

Chicago Heightspolice blocked 14th street north of the hospital, but the chopper was unable to land there because of utility wires. It was finally landed in the parking lot of the Abraham Lincoln oasis on the Tri-State tollroad in Thornton, and the child, being comforted by his mother and being ad-ministered oxygen by atten-dants, was taken to the heli-copter by ambulance.

"During this ordeal, the po-licemen were just as con-cerned as we were. I think it is too seldom that the wonderful things they do are known," Mrs. Zurek said.

Within minutes the helicopter took the boy to Children's Me-morial where the kernel of corn was extracted. Doctors told the Zureks that their son would not have lived if it were not for the efficiency of the police and fire-

"Michael is home now for Christmas, and he'll get a toy bear that talks, and whatever else Santa Claus brings. For us, Santa Claus came in a heli copter," Mrs. Zurek said.
